- 5. Unbalanced chemical equations for three different oxidation–reduction reactions involving sodium hypochlorite are listed below. Balance each equation and then, based on your data, select the reaction that corresponds to your experiment. What is the identity of Solution B? Note that both solutions contained sodium hydroxide as a basic catalyst.
